

VICTORY MEMORIAL GARDENS

Baylis Street & Morrow Street, Wagga Wagga NSW 2650

The Victory Memorial Gardens were established in 1925 as a tribute to those who fought and died in the First World War. Thomas Kerr, designer of the Sydney Botanic Gardens, was chosen to create this tribute which is located on the banks of the Wollundry lagoon in the heart of Wagga Wagga.

The garden's feature a mix of open lawns, planted garden beds, water features a playground and stage. Established trees throughout the site provide shade to most areas. This is a popular garden with visitors throughout the year.

Vehicle access to gardens from Morrow Street. Site boundaries are unfenced with pedestrian access from all sides except the north which borders the Wollundry Lagoon.
